inspire Award

Ratios, averages, fractions and more take on new meaning to students and it works. In 2004, all 120 of her students passed the mathematics section of the California High School Exit Exam.

impact Award

Students throughout San Diego County can't wait for the scientist to arrive in class,

thanks to *Partnerships Involving the Scientific Community in Elementary Schools (PISCES)* lead by Nancy Taylor of the **San Diego County Office of Education**.

The wide-ranging program in 10 school districts pairs university graduate science students with elementary school teachers. Grad students spend 4-6 hours a week in class, sharing real life science and reviewing student science journals similar to what the scientists write.

Real-world exposure inside the classroom has profoundly impacted hundreds of students and has significantly increased science instructional time. ϖ
